





Note From the Director

Akwaaba, (Welcome in Ghanaian)

Welcome to the local premiere of Jocelyn Bioh's *School Girls, or the African Mean Girls Play.* The year is 1986, and this exciting story takes place in West Africa at the Aburi Girls Boarding school.

This coming-of-age story follows the lives of six Ghanaian teenagers, on the precipice of adulthood, navigating universal issues such as body dysmorphia, bullying, self-hate, grief, and change. Paulina, the head of the "plastics" to borrow a term from Tina Fey's Mean Girls, struggles with the social enigma of a European Construct, that suggests the fairer your skin, the more acceptable/more beautiful you are to society. She attempts to remedy this with bleaching cream that yields an unexpected result. As a dark-skinned woman, I can attest that although this is a fictional story, the circumstances in this play ring true. Ericka, the new girl in town, is dealing with the incomprehensible grief of losing her mother and adjusting to a new life halfway across the world. She shares her own stories of being biracial, and not being "enough" for both communities she identifies with. Both young ladies representing the spectrum of the diaspora are experiencing their own journey with colorism. Luckily, they have the pageant to distract them from the woes of teenage life. Or perhaps, being in competition only wedges them further apart?

This brilliant dramedy examines a time within our world History where our young people on continents everywhere are faced with their own brand of systemic racism, political unrest, and division within the community. (All the while trying to survive zits, boys, dances, and typical teenage life). Sound familiar? Unfortunately, time has revealed that a lot of the challenges with colorism, systemic racism, self-hate, and bullying, are STILL in fact, an ongoing problem of today. It was a calculated move on the part of the playwright to echo the struggles with the teens to show how these hurtful mindsets have existed long before as the adult characters within the story also recanted their own history with these issues.

Unfortunately, the world still struggles with anti-blackness and our young girls post covid and post the racial reckoning of 2020 also experience the same themes and effects 60 years later within our actual timeline.

Within our rehearsal process, it has been a joy to connect with our young women. We did this through a series of temperature check ins, and both Maria Cruz, (my incredible stage manager), and I worked to create a welcome and brave space for our young ladies to step unapologetically into these archetypes. Our conversations have been insightful, healing, and explorative of both self and the themes in this play. In our cast, the Sisterhood is strong, and I am happy the future of the world rests in these empathetic, talented, and capable hands.

My fondest moment was the first rehearsal after the table read, our teens displayed a vulnerability and a support for one another that set the tone for a beautiful process.

I am grateful to have navigated this experience with not only the best creative (all women) fiercest team in the land! (Thank you!!!! Maria, Briana, Felicia, Erin, Nevaeh, Vicki, Dori, Izzi, Adelaide, Brianna, and Becky) but also a dedicated group of volunteers and parents who lent their support in a myriad of ways!!!! Finally, to our feminist allies Jack, Josh, Logan, Michael Thompson, and our biggest supporter of all KENNY G!!!! Thank you also for your contributions to this show!

Lastly, I just want to share that our youth are intelligent, independent, and talented young people, that you get the honor to call your amazing children. As you witness their crafted characters, perchance you may see a glimpse of your former selves reflected like a mirror on the stage. Perhaps you will leave understanding their perspective a little deeper. My hope is that our show sparks a dialogue within your homes, where adults and children alike can come together and get real about topical subjects that plague our teens today.

Sincere Thanks to Spotlight Youth Theatre and the Board for standing on principle that all stories deserve to be told. And, Thank YOU (the audience) for spending your evening with us in west Africa.

Sharing a sprinkle of black girl magic and sending "broken legs" to all my young Queens. Enjoy the show!
